Unit 5 American Revolution

What will we be learning? We will be studying how the tensions between Britain and the British Colonists living in the thirteen colonies boiled over into an armed conflict. This war will begin at Lexington, Massachusetts and become known as the American Revolution. Although colonists begin fighting the war to gain their rights as Englishmen, within a year after the fighting begins, colonists declare their independence from Britain and eventually win sovereignty at Yorktown seven years later. We will touch on some significant battles but the focus of our study will be on the Declaration of Independence and the Enlightenment ideals that are reflected in this document.
